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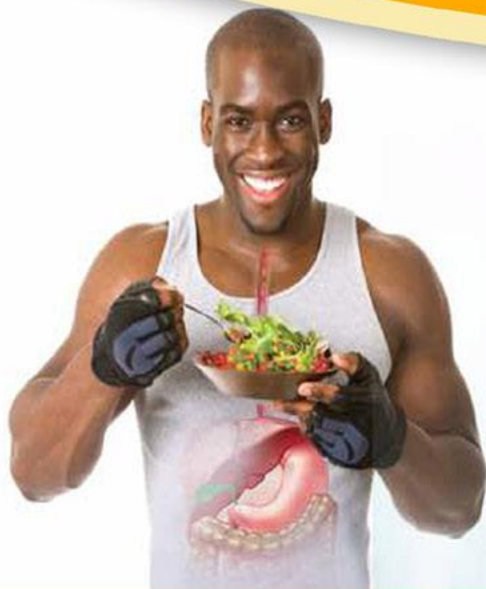

President Nana Addo Dankwa Akufo - Addo

PRESIDENT REPUBLIC OF GHANA

His Excellency Nana Addo Dankwa Akufo-Addo, the current President of Ghana since January 2017 was born in Accra, Ghana, to a prominent Ghanaian royal and political family as the son of Edward and Adeline Akufo-Addo. He hails from Kyebi in the Eastern Region of Ghana.

He started his primary education at the Government Boys School, Adabraka, and later at the Rowe Road School (now Kinbu), both in Accra Central. He went to England to study for his O-Level and A-Level examinations at Lancing College, Sussex, where he was nicknamed 'Billy'. He began the Philosophy, Politics and Economics course at New College, Oxford in 1962, but left soon afterwards.

He returned to Ghana in 1962 to teach at the Accra Academy, before going to read Economics at the University of Ghana, Legon,

in 1964, earning a BSc(Econ) degree in 1967. He subsequently joined Inner Temple and trained as a lawyer under the apprenticeship system known as the Inns of court, where no formal law degree was required. He was called to the English Bar (Middle Temple) in July 1971. He was called to the Ghanaian bar in July 1975. Akufo-Addo worked with the Paris office of the U.S. law firm Coudert Brothers. In 1979, he co-founded the law firm Prempeh and Co.

He previously served as Attorney General of Ghana from 2001 to 2003 and Minister of Foreign Affairs from 2003 to 2007. Aside his political career President Nana Addo is a legal luminary and a business man.

Nana Addo is married to Rebecca Akufo-Addo. He has five daughters .

Kwaku Agyemang-Manu is a Member of Parliament (MP) for Dormaa Central in the Brong Ahafo Region of Ghana. He has been MP for Dormaa East for several years where he served his people very well and also in different capacities in Government.

Kwaku Agyemang-Manu is a product of University of Ghana where he had his Bachelor of Science in Economics and Statistics and London School of Accountancy where he chartered as a management accountant.

He is an affable and astute politician and served in various leadership positions in Government (2001-2009) as Deputy Minister of Trade and Industry, Interior, Finance, Roads and Transport, Transport and Communication and acted briefly as the Chief Executive of the National Health Insurance Authority. When his party went into opposition and he was still the MP for Dormaa Central.

His leadership skills and competence made him the choice to be, initially the Vice Chairman and later as the substantive chairman for Public Accounts Committee where he distinguished himself and excelled by unearthing several financial malpractices in Ghana's Public Accounts.

He is recognized in the region as an executive member of the West African Association of Public Accounts Committee (WAAPAC), the Commonwealth Association of Public Accounts Committee (CAPAC) and the African Region Public Accounts Committee (AFROPAC).

Kwaku Agyemang-Manu is a very high skilled professional and politician. He is the Minister of health of the Republic of Ghana and also the Board Chairman for the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) headquartered in Geneva. He is married with six children.



PROFILE OF **PHARM. BENJAMIN KWAME BOTWE**

PRESIDENT OF THE

Pharm. Benjamin Kwame Botwe is a world renowned expert on Medicines Regulation, Quality Assurance and Pharmaceutical Sector Management. He also has wide experience in Strategic Management and Public Administration.

Pharm. Botwe has served for the past 27 years at very high levels in the public services of Ghana and Africa. He is the foundation Deputy Chief Executive (Drugs Division) of the Ghana Food and Drugs Board (now Authority) and acted as Chief Executive from October 2001 to May 2002 during which period several regulatory innovations were initiated resulting in the Board hitting the first one million dollars in its accounts as a public service institution.

He is the first Pharmacist and civilian to have served as the Executive Secretary of the Narcotics Control Board of Ghana where he is on record to have brought stability and increased competence and sanity into the control of narcotics between 2007 and 2008. Since October 2015, Mr. Botwe has been the Acting Rector of the Ghana College of Pharmacists.

Over the last seven years he has been involved in the development of Medicines Control Services

by way of policy and legislation development, drafting of regulatory guidelines and procedures and training and capacity building in many African countries including Botswana, Mozambique, Eritrea, Liberia, Sierra Leone, The Gambia and Malawi. Pharm. Botwe is a Consultant to the Medicines and Vaccines Program of the West Africa Health Organization (WAHO) where he has played a leading role in the development of the ECOWAS Regional Pharmaceutical Plan (ERPP), and the AU NEPAD African Medicines Registration Harmonization (AMRH) Project. He is also a Member of the Task Team set up by the African Union Commission for the eventual establishment of an African Medicines Agency (AMA) and wrote the Institutional and Legal Framework for its establishment.

Ben has undertaken several international consultancies with other renowned agencies like the USAID, PEPFAR, EU, USP, MANAGEMENT SCIENCES FOR HEALTH, TRANSEC, GIZ, PTB of Germany and WHO. He was part of the team of international consultants that were put together by the German Government to develop a roadmap for the establishment of a Bioequivalence Centre in Ghana. Currently he has been appointed a Short Term

Consultant (STC) by the World Bank to facilitate the harmonization of medicines regulation in the ECOWAS Region. Pharm. Botwe is a Faculty member and lecturer at the Centre for Pharmaceutical Advancement and Training (CePAT) and also teaches part of the Pharmacy Practice Regulation Course for the West Africa Postgraduate College of Pharmacists and represents the PSGH as an observer on the USP Convention.

Pharm. Botwe holds a Bachelor of Pharmacy honours degree from KNUST and a co-recipient of the Dr. John Ocran Award. He obtained a Master of Science in Pharmaceutical Analysis from the University of Strathclyde in Glasgow, UK; Master of Public Administration from GIMPA, Accra; Post Graduate certificate in Strategic Leadership from MSH, Boston, USA; and Post Graduate Certificate in Managing Analytical Laboratories from the University of North West (Potchestroom) in South Africa. He is currently pursuing a Doctor of Philosophy in Management and Leadership at the Management University

of Africa in Nairobi, Kenya.

Pharm. Botwe is a Fellow of the Ghana College of Pharmacists, Fellow of the West African Postgraduate College of Pharmacists and a Member of the International Pharmaceutical Federation (FIP). He has authored and/ or co-authored over twelve publication in the field of medicines regulation and quality assurance and has been cited in several publications. He has attended over 50 Conferences in this field at several of which he has been speaker, moderator, panelist, general rapporteur or chair of specific sessions.

Pharm. Botwe is the current Chairman of the National Committee on Health and Environment of the Presbyterian Church of Ghana that oversees all the hospitals and health facilities of the Church and also the Lay Representative of the Kaneshie District of the Church to the Ga West Presbytery Session Council.

Pharm. Botwe stood unopposed as President of the Pharmaceutical Society of Ghana at the 2017 PSGH Conference held at the Great Hall, KNUST. He is married to Baaba Botwe with whom they have three girls and a boy.

Anthony K. Wutoh, Ph.D., R.Ph. is the Provost and Chief Academic Officer of Howard University. He previously served in various roles at the University including as Dean of the College of Pharmacy and Assistant Provost for International Programs. Dr. Wutoh has also served as Director for the Center for Minority Health Services Research, the Center of Excellence.

Dr. Wutoh received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Biochemistry from the University of Maryland Baltimore County in 1987. He then completed a Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy, and Doctor of Philosophy in Pharmacy Administration (Pharmacoepidemiology) at the University of Maryland, Baltimore School of Pharmacy. Dr. Wutoh has varied research interests including pharmacoepidemiology, international health, health services/outcomes research, and evaluation of large population databases, particularly in the area of AIDS and HIV infection in older patients.

Dr. Wutoh has received over \$60 million dollars in grant funding from several sources including; NIH, CDC, USAID, HRSA, AHRQ and foundations,

and has published numerous research articles on HIV disease, medication adherence, disease state management, and various other topics in respected research journals, including; the Journal of the American Medical Association, Health Services Research, AIDS & Behavior, the Journal of the National Medical Association, and the Journal of the American Pharmacists Association.

Dr. Wutoh has led, and participated in various international programs including sponsored projects (USAID, CDC, PEPFAR, etc.) in Nigeria, South Africa, Zambia, Kenya, Rwanda, Tanzania, Ethiopia, Ghana, etc. Dr. Wutoh has been a practicing pharmacist in Maryland since 1990 and has worked in various settings including hospital, retail, consulting, and community pharmacy, as well as academia. In 1993, He served as a policy intern with the U.S. Senate Special Committee on Aging where he was directed with evaluation of the economic impact of health care reform on the pharmaceutical and biotechnology industries.

His other areas of interest and expertise include

minority access to novel medical therapies, medication compliance, post-marketing assessment, clinical trial protocol and evaluation, survival analyses, and the role of stress in the functioning of health care professionals. He is also the recipient of various awards and acclamations including the 1998 Excellence Award for Professor in the Division of Pharmacy, College of Pharmacy, Nursing, and Allied Health Sciences, the 2007 Distinguished Faculty Award from the Howard University Pharmacy Alumni Association, the 2017 Distinguished Alumni Award from the University of Maryland School of Pharmacy, and the 2017 Edward Bouchet Legacy Award.

Dr. Wutoh is married to Rita Wutoh, MD, MPH, and they are the proud parents of two daughters, Nadya and Niya.

Thank you!!! Akpe nami!!!

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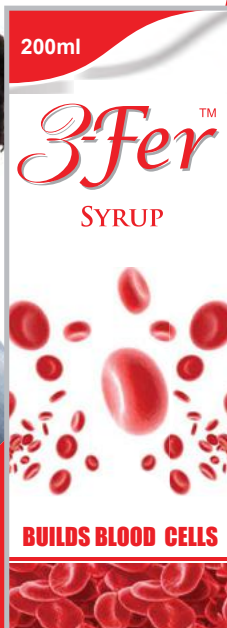

Dr. Bampoe is also the Incident Commander of Ghana's Ebola Emergency Operations Center (EOC). Before being appointed by President John Mahama of Ghana to this role, Dr. Bampoe was a Senior Fund Portfolio Manager at the Global Fund to Fight HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria based in Geneva, Switzerland. In that role,

Dr. Bampoe was responsible for managing grants to fight the three diseases in South Africa, with a total value of more than \$800 million. Dr. Bampoe worked at the Global Fund in various capacities from 2005: he served as the Fund Manager in Kenya, Rwanda, Uganda, and Zambia, and was also the Risk Manager, as well as the Team Leader for Southern Africa.

Before he took up his role at the Global Fund, Dr. Bampoe worked with the UK Department for International Development (DFID) as a Regional Health and HIV Adviser, and before that as a Medical Officer with the Ministry of Health in Ghana.

Dr. Bampoe is a medical doctor by training, with a specialization in public health obtained at the prestigious Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health in Baltimore, Maryland.

of International Society for Pharmacoeconomics and Outcomes Research (ISPOR). She has coordinated several assessments of the pharmaceutical sector in Ghana with meaningful contributions to the health sector dialogue. Mrs Gyansa-Lutterodt is a Fellow of West African Post-graduate College of Pharmacists and a Foundation Fellow of Ghana College of Pharmacists.

Martha is the current chair for Ghana's Antimicrobial Resistance Working group that responded to the Global Action Plan on antimicrobial resistance with a country working mechanism. Apostle Dr. Opoku Onyinah is the immediate past Chairman of The Church of Pentecost worldwide and the immediate past President of the Ghana Pentecostal and Charismatic Council (GPCC). He was born on July 22, 1954 at Aduman, in the Ashanti Region of Ghana. He holds a Doctor of Philosophy in Theological Studies from the University of Birmingham (2002) and a Master of Theology in Applied Theology at Regents Theological College (offered by the University of Manchester, 1998). On the global front, he is a Commissioner of World Mission and Evangelism of the World Council of Churches and also serves as the Co-Chairman of Empowered21, Africa.

Apostle Opoku Onyinah, now a professor, was called into the full-time ministry of The Church of Pentecost in 1976 and has since served in various capacities, including Rector of Pentecost University College, Executive Council Member, International Missions Director, and an Adjunct Lecturer at the Pentecost Bible Training Centre (now Pentecost Theological Seminary). He was called into the ministry of The Church of

Pentecost in 1976 from Tamale, Northern Ghana. His first station was Waas District Overseer from 1976-1981.

His successive post as a minister of God were; Kumasi as District Pastor from 1981-1984, He as Regional Head from 1984-1986, London-UK for further studies from 1986-1988, Koforidua as Regional Head from 1988-1991, Headquarters as the 1st International Missions Director (IMD) from 1991-1996, London-UK for further studies from 1996-2002, Pentecost University College as Rector from 2002-2008 and finally as Chairman of The Church of Pentecost-Worldwide from 2008 to 2018.

He is the author of numerous books and articles including: "Pentecostals & Charismatics," "Spiritual Warfare," "Resting In The Lord," "Are Two Persons The Same?" "Pressure of Success," "Taking The Ultimate Step In Marriage" and "African Christianity In The 21st Century." Prof. Opoku is married to Grace Opoku Onyinah, and together they have been blessed with five children.

Quality Control of Traditional Medicines: A Case of *Chlorophora regia* (Moraceae)

Introduction

Can the quality of herbal medicinal products be assured along the value chains? This question has been a global concern especially with recent attempts to adopt the use of herbal medicines into the conventional health-care system. Developing methods for quality control and standardization of traditional medicines would improve healthcare delivery in developing countries. The stem bark of *Chlorophora regia* (Moraceae) has several medicinal uses including treatment of rheumatism, lumbago, asthma, burns and wounds. This research seeks to develop and validate an HPLC method, using a biomarker, for the quality control of the stem bark of *C. regia* and by extension herbal medicinal products containing the stem bark extracts of this plant.

Method

Extraction, isolation and purification of a biomarker from the powdered stem bark of the plant was carried out using column chromatography on silica and sephadex LH 20. The isolated biomarker was characterized and identified as Regiafuran A using detailed NMR

spectroscopy (1D and 2D). A reverse-phase (RP) HPLC method using μ BondapakTM C18 (3.9×300 mm, 5 μ m) column with PDA detection (250 nm), gradient elution; 0.1% Trifluoroacetic acid (A) and Methanol (B), was developed to analyse the biomarker.

Results and Discussion

The retention time of the biomarker was found to be 14.13 ± 0.015 min. The biomarker was subsequently identified in the extract based on the retention time. The developed method was validated in accordance with the ICH guidelines. It showed linearity within the ranges of 2-32 μ g/ml with a correlation coefficient (R) of 0.9998. The limit of detection (LOD) and quantification (LOQ) were 0.57 μ g/ml and 1.73 μ g/ml respectively. Inter-day and intra-day precisions of less than 2% were obtained with an average percentage recovery of $103.04\% \pm 1.140\%$.

Conclusion

The developed method can be effectively used for the routine quality control and standardization of the stem bark of *C. regia* and products containing its extracts.



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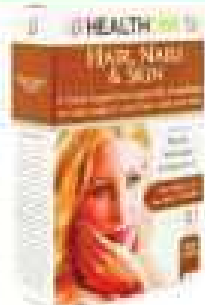

Antibiotic Prescription Patterns In The Out-Patient Department (OPD) Of University Of Ghana Hospital, Legon

Introduction

The use of antibiotics in any healthcare setting is indispensable which makes the current challenge of antimicrobial resistance a huge threat to health globally. One of the causes of antibiotic resistance which renders previously successful medicines ineffective against pathogenic bacteria is the misuse (i.e. over prescription or inappropriate prescription) of antibiotics in general. Apart from the risk of resistance, there is also the increased occurrence of adverse drug reactions when antibiotics are misused. This makes antibiotic prescribing pattern studies necessary in identifying challenges that occur with antibiotic use and to recommend solutions or interventions. There is very little information on the prescription pattern of antibiotics in hospitals in Ghana. This study sought to describe the antibiotic prescribing pattern in the Out-Patient Department (OPD) of a primary hospital in Accra, Ghana.

Methods

A retrospective study was conducted using 260 prescriptions issued from 1 August 2016 to 31 July 2017 from the University of Ghana Hospital. Prescribing indicators adapted from the WHO

and USAID documents on how to investigate antimicrobial use in hospitals were employed. The results were analyzed using Microsoft Excel 2013.

Results and discussion

The most prescribed antibiotics were amoxicillin/clavulanic acid, cefuroxime, ciprofloxacin, and flucloxacillin. The percentage encounter with antibiotics was 37% and 8.8% of the prescriptions contained injectable antibiotics. The average number of antibiotics per encounter was 1.15 but only 9.6% of these prescriptions were based on some laboratory test. 83.6% of the antibiotics prescribed were found on the Essential Medication List and 88.1% of the prescriptions conformed to the Standard Treatment Guidelines. 56.5% of antibiotics prescribed were prescribed with their generic names.

Conclusion

Overall, the prescribing of antibiotics in the UG Hospital was satisfactory but it is recommended antibiotic prescriptions are made based on culture sensitivity tests and also medicines are prescribed with generic rather than brand names.

Is It Time To Assess The Impact Of The T3 Policy On Act Consumption? A Case Study Of Ningo - Prampram District

Introduction

The “Test, Treat and Track (T3)” policy, introduced by the National Malaria Control Program (NMCP) in 2010 aims to ensure that all suspected malaria cases receive laboratory confirmatory tests (RDT/ microscopy) before treatment with recommended oral artemisinin based combination therapies (ACTs). This study assessed the relationship between confirmed malaria cases and ACT consumption 4 years after the introduction of the T3 policy in the Ningo Prampram District of Ghana.

Method

Extraction, isolation and purification of a biomarker from the powdered stem bark of the plant was carried out using column chromatography on silica and sephadex LH 20. The isolated biomarker was characterized and identified as Regiafuran A using detailed NMR spectroscopy (1D and 2D). A reverse-phase (RP) HPLC method using μ BondapakTM C18 (3.9×300 mm, 5 μ m) column with PDA detection (250 nm), gradient elution; 0.1% Trifluoroacetic acid (A) and Methanol (B), was developed to analyse the biomarker.

Results and Discussion

Between January 2015 and April 2018, a total of 75,496 suspected malaria cases were seen in the district of which 27,738 (36.7%) were confirmed. An average of 52.0% (95% CI: 49.3% -54.7%) of suspected malaria cases were confirmed per month per facility. Furthermore, 59.1% (95% CI: 56.4% - 61.9%) of suspected malaria cases were treated with ACTs per month per facility. A significant linear relationship was observed between confirmed malaria cases and ACT treatments ($R^2 = 0.184$, $P < 0.00001$). Additionally, it was observed that, in the absence of confirmed malaria cases (intercept), an average of 55 suspected malaria cases were treated with ACT per month per facility ($P < 0.00001$).

Conclusion

The study successfully demonstrated a linear relationship between confirmed malaria cases and ACT use. Aside confirmed cases, other factors may potentially contribute to ACT consumption. This calls for further studies to assess the impact of the T3 policy on ACT consumption.

Do All Beta Blockers provide the same magnitude of clinically convincing mortality benefits in Chronic Heart Failure Patients? : A Literature Review.

Introduction

The Chronic Heart Failure is characterized as a disorder arising from a complex interaction between impaired ventricular performance and neurohormonal activation. Beta Blockers are considered an integral component of therapy for chronic heart failure patients. Clinical trials have been conducted to determine the mortality benefits of these agents in Chronic Heart Failure patients. The aim of this literature review is to ascertain whether all beta blockers possess the evidence that demonstrates their mortality benefits in Chronic Heart Failure patients.

Methodology

A literature search was conducted via the Google Scholar. The keywords: Beta Blockers, mortality and Heart Failure were employed as search terms. The search was limited to studies conducted between January 1990 and December 2017 and published in the English Language. Randomized trials, meta-analysis and systematic reviews were filtered.

Results and discussion

The search yielded a total of Two Hundred and Fourteen Thousand (214,000) results. Studies with inconclusive findings, those conducted in the setting of Acute Heart Failure and trials lacking mortality benefits were not included in the final review. A total of five studies were considered in the final analysis due to the overwhelming mortality benefits in their findings. These studies used mainly carvedilol, bisoprolol and metoprolol succinate as therapeutic interventions.

Conclusion

This review suggests that, not all beta blockers provide the same magnitude of clinically convincing mortality benefits in Chronic Heart Failure patients. Only Bisoprolol, Carvedilol and Metoprolol Succinate possess such scientific evidence, hence they are considered as evidence based beta blockers.

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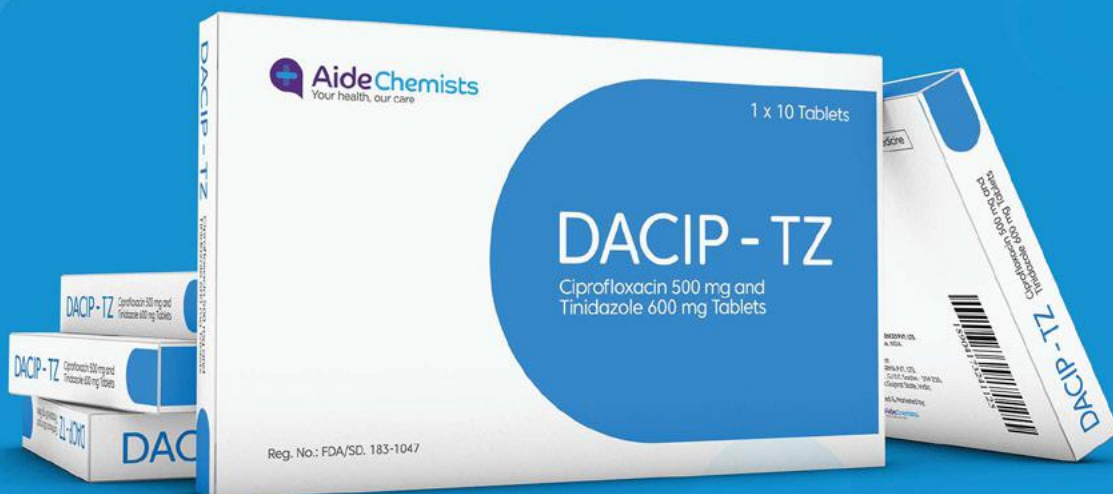

Studies on the analgesic effects of an ethanolic extract of *Desmodium adscendens* in rodents

Introduction

Pain is a major symptom usually associated with most disease states. Its management still remains unsatisfactory despite the existence of many therapies, making it a global burden. Medicinal plants have been used since medieval times and are still being used today for treating some ailments. *Desmodium adscendens* is used traditionally for the treatment of epilepsy, pain and inflammatory conditions. However, data on its effect on pain is very scanty. This study sought to investigate the analgesic effect of an ethanolic extract of *D. adscendens* in rodents.

Method

The pulverized plant material of *D. adscendens* was extracted with 70%v/v ethanol by cold maceration. Chemical, thermal and neuropathic pain were induced in rodents. The possible mechanism(s) of analgesia of the extract were also investigated with receptor specific antagonists.

Results and Discussion

The extract of *D. adscendens* (DAE) attenuated acetic acid-induced writhings ($P=0.0012$),

ameliorated formalin-induced nociceptive pain in both the first ($P=0.0058$) and second phases ($P=0.0116$), increased the %Maximum Possible Effect (MPE) in the hot plate test ($P<0.0001$) and significantly reduced paclitaxel-induced neuropathic pain in both thermal hyperalgesia ($P<0.0001$) and cold allodynia ($P=0.0024$).

The analgesic effect exhibited by DAE was significantly reversed in the presence of naloxone, glibenclamide, ondansetron, prazosin and yohimbine. By contrast, DAE's analgesic effects were not significantly affected in the presence of theophylline, atropine, L-Nitro-arginine methyl ester (L-NAME) and nifedipine.

Conclusion

The ethanolic extract of *D. adscendens* exhibited profound analgesic effect against chemical, thermal nociception and paclitaxel-induced neuropathic pain. DAE may be utilizing the opioidergic, adrenergic systems and ATP-sensitive K^+ channels and to some extent, the serotonergic pathway to reduce pain.

Incidence and risk factors for tenofovir–associated renal toxicity in a cohort of HIV infected patients in the Korle-Bu Teaching Hospital, Ghana

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Background

The association of tenofovir disoproxil fumarate (TDF) with renal dysfunction has remained an area of interest. The purpose of this study was to estimate the long term effects of TDF on renal profile and identify potential risk factors associated with renal impairment.

Method

300 consecutive HIV-positive patients (with baseline creatinine clearance (CrCl) above 50 mL/min) initiated on TDF-based antiretroviral treatment from 2008 were selected from a database capturing all patients on antiretroviral therapy at the Korle-Bu Teaching Hospital. Socio-demographic details, clinical characteristics, laboratory and antiretroviral regimens were collected from patients' medical records. CrCl was calculated using the Cockcroft-Gault equation at baseline and as per institutional guidelines for renal function test. Renal impairment was categorised as moderate (reduction between 30 mL/min and 49.9 mL/min) and severe (reduction below 30 mL/min). Proportion of patients with moderate or severe renal impairment was calculated. Relative risks (RRs) and 95%

confidence intervals (CIs) were calculated for factors associated with renal impairment.

Results and discussion

Median follow up time was 2.9 years. Females were dominant (n=213, 71.1%) and mean age was 39.1 ± 11.1 years. Median CrCl rate at initiation was 76.8 mL/min. At study endpoint, 63 participants (21%) recorded CrCl rate below 50 mL/min indicating incident renal impairment, comprised 18.3% moderate and 2.3% severe renal impairment. Factors associated were increasing age (RR=1.04) per year, decrease in creatinine clearance rate at baseline (RR=1.05) per every 1 mL decrease, WHO HIV stage III (RR=3.78) or Stage IV (RR=3.42) compared with stage I and participants with BMI <18.5 kg/m² underweight (RR=3.87) compared with patients with BMI >18.5-24.9 kg/m².

Conclusion

The use of TDF based regimen may have led to 18.3% moderate and 2.3% severe renal impairment. Patients with identified risk factors should be targeted and monitored effectively to prevent renal injury.

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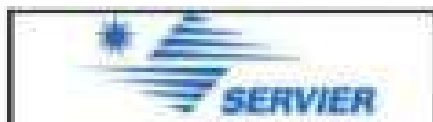

Improving Non-Traditional Export Trade for National Development: Development of RP-HPLC Method for the Quality Control of the Seeds of *Voacanga africana* Stapf

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Introduction

The seeds of *Voacanga africana* Stapf (Apocynaceae), rich in indole alkaloids, is an important non-traditional export commodity in Ghana because the indole alkaloids are a cheaper source of starting material for the production of nootropic and geriatric medicines by some pharmaceutical companies. However, this export trade is limited by the lack of adequate quality control tools locally. This study, therefore, sought to improve the *Voacanga* trade in Ghana by providing a standard means of chemical quality control for the seeds prior to export.

Method

Six different alkaloids were isolated and purified from the seeds using acid-base fractionation, isocratic column chromatography (silica gel stationary phase and chloroform: ethyl acetate; 60: 40, v/v mobile phase) and recrystallization. The most abundant of the alkaloids was characterized spectroscopically (UV, FT-IR, NMR and MS) and elucidated as coronaridine. An isocratic reverse phase High Performance Liquid Chromatography (RP-HPLC) method

(μ -Bondapak C18, 3.9 x 300 mm, 5 μ m; water: methanol; 60: 40, v/v; 1.5 mL/min) with UV detection (206 nm) was developed and validated using the coronaridine as a biomarker.

Results and Discussion

The retention time of the biomarker was 2.9 ± 0.03 min. The calibration plot was linear over the concentration range 1.40 μ g/mL - 22.40 μ g/mL with a coefficient of regression (r) of 0.9996. The Limit of Detection (LOD) and Limit of Quantitation (LOQ) were 0.60 μ g/mL and 1.81 μ g/mL, respectively. An average recovery of 84.0 ± 5.80 % was obtained, as well as an intra-day and intermediate precision (as measured by the Relative Standard Deviation, RSD) of 1.93 % and 1.65 %, respectively. The proposed method was found as accurate, precise, specific and robust in accordance with ICH guidelines.

Conclusion

A validated simple and economical isocratic RP-HPLC method has been developed for the routine quality control of the seeds of *Voacanga africana* to boost Ghana's export trade.

Occupational Exposure To Human Immuno Deficiency Virus (HIV) And Post Exposure Prophylaxis (PEP) Delivered At The Child Health Pharmacy Of Korle Bu Teaching Hospital (KBTH)

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Background

Healthcare workers around the globe are at an increased risk of exposure to HIV. Post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) is the use of short-term antiretroviral therapy (ART) to reduce the risk of HIV infection following exposure. This study reviewed all the cases of occupational exposure reporting at the Child Health Pharmacy of KBTH between January 2015 and December 2017.

Method

All needle sticks and sharp injuries (NSSI) at the Child Health Department of KBTH report at the Pharmacy for management. Risk assessment is first done and PEP administered based on the WHO and KBTH protocol. Cases are followed up with repeat laboratory investigations at 3 months. All cases are carefully recorded together with copies of the laboratory results. This data was extracted manually onto an excel sheet and imported into STATA for analysis. Analysis was limited to descriptive statistics.

Results and discussion

A total of 54 cases were recorded with 32

doctors, 6 nurses, 11 orderlies and 5 other allied professionals. There were more female (56%) than male (44%) cases with a mean age of 28 years. All cases reported within 72 hours of exposure and 35% reported within 24 hours. Nearly all the cases (96.2%) were due to NSSI with 3.8% due to splashes. Of the 29 cases who qualified for PEP, 38% took combivir only (lamivudine/zidovudine) while 62% took combivir and aluvia (lopinavir and ritonavir). A total of 90% completed the 28 day course while 10% stopped after the risk was determined to be too low to continue. All 54 cases tested negative for HIV at the 3 month follow up testing.

Conclusion

The current system of tracking and treating occupational exposure to HIV at the Child Health Department appears effective with doctors being the most at risk professionals. Periodic monitoring and evaluation of the current system is recommended.

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RESTORING THE SKIN INTEGRITY AND FUNCTION – THE ROLE OF BIO OIL

During pregnancy, one of the major changes the body undergoes is increase amount of fluid retention and weight gain. The skin ordinarily, adapts continuously to these changes by expanding to accommodate the changes. However because these changes are more rapid during pregnancy, unfortunately, the skin doesn't get enough time to adjust to this increases, leading to expansion and a pull pressure on the skin in some areas. This result in internal tears that subsequently heal leaving scars we call stretch marks. As the weight gain and body expansion increase with the age of the pregnancy, these stretch marks get more severe and become visible towards the third trimester of pregnancy in various shapes and length.

Pregnancy stretch marks are these shiny lines that may develop on the skin of a pregnant woman's abdomen, breasts, shoulders, thighs, hips, or buttocks. They have no negative effects on the woman or baby's health. But these stretch marks affect the beauty and appearance of the skin permanently.

Additionally, stretch marks are also common among body builders; teenagers going through growth spurts and individuals pursuing weight gain programs prior to undergoing major surgery. In such circumstances stretch marks appear and are visible around the shoulders, side of the arms, back of the shin and back of the thighs. Pregnancy stretch marks and stretch marks in general are very

common with dark -skinned population, affecting about 8 out of 10 especially in the younger ages. The presence of stretch marks has a negative impact on the beauty and elegance of the skin and has been found to affect the individual's confidence, and in several instances making them uncomfortable in wearing certain clothes that are likely to make their stretch marks visible.

Challenges Associated With The Phone Call - HIV Treatment Retention Technique Among Adolescent Patients In The Kumasi Metropolis, Ghana

Introduction

One of the goals of UNAIDS' 90-90-90 is ensuring that 90 percent of people on antiretroviral (ARV) treatment are virally suppressed. Viral suppression is possible through long-term, correct usage of ARVs, and can be achieved through mechanisms in the health system to promote compliance among these patients. Phone call is one of the HIV care retention techniques being used by healthcare professionals working in ART clinics to trace loss to follow-up. This technique may be associated with challenges that hinder retention of adolescents in medical care. The aim of this study was to explore challenges associated with the phone call HIV treatment retention technique that adolescent HIV patients and ART healthcare providers face in the Kumasi Metropolis in the Ashanti Region, Ghana.

Method

A qualitative study was conducted at four (4) selected ART clinics, from September 2017 to February 2018. In-depth individual interviews were conducted with thirty (30) consented patients (aged 14-19 years) on ARV for a minimum period of one year and 16 healthcare professionals working in the ART clinics,

purposively sampled. The thematic approach was used to analyse the data.

Results and Discussion

The challenges associated with the phone call technique include patient/carrier not having personal phones (not feeling comfortable enough with using other people's phones out of fear of raising suspicion and evoking questions that might lead to disclosure of their HIV status, fear of stigmatisation by community members, fear of confidentiality breach by the healthcare provider); difficult to reach lost to follow up (wrong telephone numbers, wrong house address, client/carrier travel without appropriate arrangement and loss of the primary phone owner); logistical problems; and contract adherence monitors.

Conclusion

Phone call can help to identify and trace adolescent HIV patients (lost to follow up) but several challenges and issues need to be addressed when employing the phone call HIV treatment retention technique.

Inappropriate Dispensing Practices For Antimalarials In The La-Nkwantanang Madina Municipality, Greater Accra-Ghana

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Background

Empirical research and interventions on dispensing practices lag behind, partly because of the complexity of dispensing practices and the dearth of available data at the community level. Few studies conducted, focuses on dispensing practices in hospital pharmacies. The primary purpose of this study is to investigate predictors of dispensing practices for antimalarials in community pharmacies.

Method

Sixty- one randomly selected community pharmacies were involved in the cross sectional analytic study. Data were collected from 230 clients, who had been dispensed antimalarials by 106 dispensers. Frequencies, chi square test and logistic regression analysis were conducted, accounting for clustering.

Results and Discussion

Over 70% of the dispensers were medicine counter assistants. The mean age of dispensers was 30.4 years (SD 8.8). More than half of

the clients (52.2%) were given appropriate dispensing information on antimalarial use. Over 88.0% of clients were advised to complete the full course. However, the 8-hour loading dose principle for Artemether/Lumefantrine was not explained to 88.3% of the clients. Most clients, 152 (66.1%), were dispensed antimalarials without malaria tests. Dispensers with more than 10 years' experience were less likely to dispense ACTs appropriately (AOR = 0.08, 95%CI = 0.08 0.01-0.81 p-value=0.032) while pharmacy interns were 24 times more likely (AOR = 24.0, 95%CI = 1.18-501.90 p-value=0.039) to dispense ACT's appropriately compared to pharmacists.

Conclusion

Dispensing practices for antimalarials is sub optimal. Action oriented update on the knowledge and skills of dispensers, targeting those with more than 10 years' work experience is recommended. Education should focus on adherence and compliance to WHO's Test, Treat and Track initiative to reduce the burden of antimalarial drug resistance.

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Insuman Rapid, Insuman Basal, Insuman Comb 100IU/ml solution/suspension for injection in a vial; in cartridge Each ml contains 100 IU insulin human (equivalent to 3.5 mg). Each vial contains 10 ml of solution for injection, equivalent to 1000 IU insulin. Each cartridge contains 3 ml of solution for injection, equivalent to 300 IU insulin. Insuman Rapid is a neutral insulin solution (regular insulin). Insuman Basal is an isophane insulin suspension. Insuman Comb 30 is a biphasic isophane insulin suspension consisting of 30% dissolved insulin and 70% crystalline protamine insulin. Human insulin is produced by recombinant DNA technology in *Escherichia coli*. Excipients: Metacresol, sodium dihydrogen phosphate dihydrate, glycerol, sodium hydroxide, hydrochloric acid (for pH adjustment), water for injections. **THERAPEUTIC INDICATIONS:** Diabetes mellitus where treatment with insulin is required. Insuman Rapid is also suitable for the treatment of hyperglycaemic coma and ketoacidosis, as well as for achieving pre- and post-operative stabilisation in patients with diabetes mellitus. **POSICOLOGY AND METHOD OF ADMINISTRATION:** The desired blood glucose levels, the insulin preparations to be used and the insulin dose regimen (dose and timing) must be determined individually and adjusted to suit the patient's diet, physical activity and life-style. There are no fixed rules for insulin dose regimen. However, the average insulin requirements is often 0.5 to 1.0 IU per kg body weight per day. The basal metabolic requirement is 40% to 60% of the total daily requirement. Insuman Rapid is injected subcutaneously 15 to 20 minutes before a meal. In the treatment of severe hyperglycaemia or ketoacidosis in particular, insulin administration is part of a complex therapeutic regimen which includes measures to protect patients from possible severe complications of a relatively rapid lowering of blood glucose. This regimen requires close monitoring (metabolic status, acid-base and electrolyte status, vital parameters etc.) in an intensive care unit or similar setting. Secondary dose adjustment: Improved metabolic control may result in increased insulin sensitivity, leading to a reduced insulin requirement. Dose adjustment may also be required, for example, if the patient's weight changes, the patient's life-style changes, other circumstances arise that may promote an increased susceptibility to hypo- or hyperglycaemia. Special populations: Insulin requirements may be diminished in patients with renal impairment, in the elderly and patients with severe hepatic impairment. Method of administration: Insuman must not be used in external or implanted insulin pumps or peristaltic pumps with silicone tubing. Only injection syringes designed for the desired strength of insulin are to be used. The injection syringes must not contain any other medicinal product or residue (e.g. traces of heparin). Insuman is administered subcutaneously. Insuman Rapid may also be administered intravenously but must generally take place in an intensive care unit or under comparable monitoring and treatment conditions. Insuman Basal and Insuman Comb must never be injected intravenously. **CONTRA-INDICATIONS:** Hypersensitivity to the active substances or to any of the excipients. **SPECIAL WARNINGS AND SPECIAL PRECAUTIONS FOR USE:** Patients hypersensitive to Insuman Rapid for whom no better tolerated preparation is available must only continue treatment under close medical supervision and - where necessary - in conjunction with anti-allergic treatment. In patients with an allergy to animal insulin intradermal skin testing is recommended prior to a transfer to Insuman Rapid, since they may experience immunological cross-reactions. In case of insufficient glucose control or a tendency to hypo- or hyperglycaemic episodes, the patient's adherence to the prescribed treatment regimen, injection sites and proper injection technique and all other relevant factors must be reviewed before dose adjustment is considered. Transferring a patient to another type or brand of insulin should be done under strict medical supervision. Following transfer from an animal insulin to human insulin, dose regimen reduction may be required. Close metabolic monitoring is recommended during the transition and in the initial weeks thereafter. Hypoglycaemia may occur if the insulin dose is too high in relation to the insulin requirement. Particular caution should be exercised, and intensified blood glucose monitoring is advisable in patients in whom hypoglycaemic episodes might be of particular clinical relevance. Patients should be aware of circumstances where warning symptoms of hypoglycaemia are diminished. Adherence of the patient to the dose regimen and dietary regimen, correct insulin administration and awareness of hypoglycaemia symptoms are essential to reduce the risk of hypoglycaemia. Intercurrent illness requires intensified metabolic monitoring. Insulin label must always be checked before each injection to avoid medication errors between insulin human and other insulins. 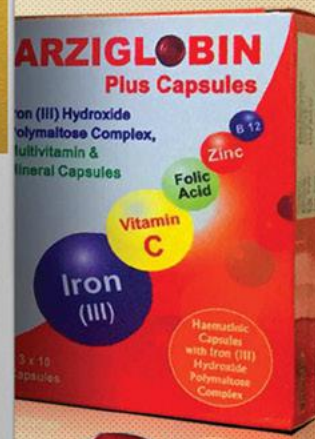

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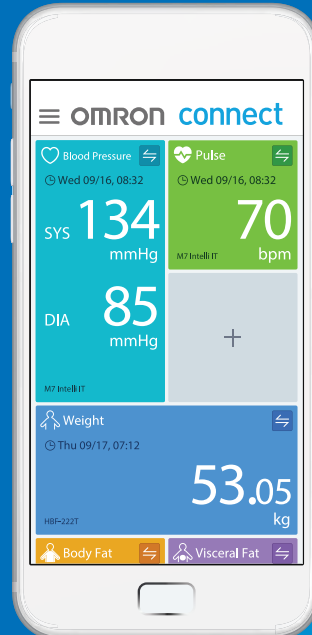
